To know how to use mod-roc to create a 3D replica of a Greek vase.

To know how to use sketching to study the decoration on Greek pottery in more detail, looking at colour, shape and pattern.

To know how to design decorative details for our own pots and add them using black paint and a fine brush.

To know how to evaluate our final pieces, reflecting on aspects such as form, colour, pattern and unity.

isolate	Identifies the primary subject in a work of art by clearly separating it from other elements in a composition.
matchstick figures	A picture of a person drawn only with thin lines for the arms and legs, a circle for the head, etc.
